### Lesson 57: Sounds of *GH*, *IGH*, and *IGHT*

When *gh* comes at the beginning of a word, it has the sound /g/, as in *gh<sup>o</sup>st*.

When *gh* comes at the end of a word, it sometimes has the sound /f/, as in *laugh<sup>f</sup>*.

In most words, *gh* is silent. When *i* comes before *gh*, the *i* has the long sound, as in *si<sup>i</sup>gh* and *si<sup>i</sup>ght*.
